10: Please give us your overall impression of this exchange and let us know what you think to have gained from this 'Erasmus experience':

Haarlem:

- Having completed the Erasmus Exchange program, I can say that the last 3 months have been wonderful, and an experience that I would repeat given the opportunity. In Holland University is very modern and a well equipped place of study. I was very impressed at the overall impression of the university but especially the facilities available to the radiography / radiotherapy students. The workload was not hectic therefore we had time to explore the different cities in Holland as well as neighbouring countries. I improved my Treatment planning skills immensely and I learnt a lot in a very laid back environment. I wish to express how friendly and accommodating everyone has been both inside and outside the university. It has been great to get the opportunity to live with people of different nationalities from whom I learnt a lot and will remain friends with. The hospital placement was very interesting and gave me the chance to see procedures I would not see at home, for example IMRT and Stereotactic radiotherapy. The staff took a lot of time to explain the hospital procedures in English. The only one disappointment I have had on this experience was the accommodation. This was not great, however everyone pulled together and made it a home for the past 3 months. Thanks to everyone who made my stay in The Netherlands one to remember (Northern Ireland).
- My stay here in The Netherlands has been an absolutely brilliant experience. Every person I have met and came into contact with has been very friendly and very accommodating. In Holland university is a very modern and well equipped place of study, and both the staff and students have lived up to these expectations. The learning schedule was well thought out and was delivered to us in a very high standard. The topics covered were of great use and I have learned so much during my 3 month stay. The workload was not that hectic and so it gave me the chance to go exploring around the cities in Holland as well as the countries surrounding it. - The ERASMUS experience has been brilliant. I have learnt a lot about Ultrasound, an opportunity that I would not have had at home. The classes were well organised and not too stressful! The school is really modern and has lots of equipment to practice on. We were able to practice scanning on the ultrasound machines when we had spare time and the Dutch students were very helpful when we had any problems. By the end of 13 weeks we were able to scan the abdomen and were assessed doing so in a problem based learning format. It has been brilliant having the opportunity to live with people of other nationalities and also having the chance to travel round the Netherlands and visit Brussels, Milan and Paris on our week off. We spent 4 days on clinical placement, which was really good. Although it was sometimes hard when everyone was speaking in Dutch, it was good to see how a radiography department was run in another country. Although we were at first 'surprised' by the accommodation, we soon got used to it and thought of it as home, despite the mice! Overall the experience has been one I will never forget and would really recommend anyone to take the chance to take part in this once in a lifetime experience. (Northern Ireland).
- The last three months have been a wonderful experience. I have had the opportunity to meet and live with people from other countries, which has been really interesting. The Dutch people are very friendly and most have really good English. The university is fairly new and modern and has a lot of equipment that we do not have at our home institute. The Dutch students were extremely helpful and guided us from the start to the end. Without the students this experience would not have been as fun. The workload was not hectic therefore we had time to explore the different cities in Holland as well as neighbouring countries. The hospital placement was very interesting and gave me the chance to see procedures I would not see at home example IMRT and cone beam radiotherapy. The staff took the time to explain the procedures in English. The only drawback was the accommodation, which was very poor. We had mice for the whole three months there was also a break in the first night but the lecturers were very good and came out the next day and got us better security. But overall this really was a once in a lifetime experience and would recommend anyone to do it. (Northern Ireland).
- When I first arrived at INHOLLAND I was quite daunted by how modern and cool looking it was. However, I was soon put at ease by the friendly atmosphere and approachable staff. Geert was so much fun and made us have a good giggle doing the icebreaker. We also met Frank, who was absolutely lovely and very helpful. The university is extremely modern, and something to be really proud of. It seems to be very environmentally friendly and technologically advanced. This exchange has been one of the best things I have ever taken part in, I have met so many people from The Netherlands and from other countries, it is something I would definitely recommend it to others. The Dutch students that were helping us did more than enough and will really appreciate everything they did for us. Our time on placement was an eye opener as well and it showed us other technologies in use, and techniques not yet in use in Northern Ireland. (Northern Ireland).
- The past 3 months have been an incredible experience and have taught me a lot about how other Universities operate and how the Radiography programme differs from country to country. It seems completely different to how our home university operates, with the students here doing things a lot more independently. I think that this is good as it teaches self reliance and independence of thought, but at the same time I perhaps would have preferred more supervision for the practical aspects of the programme to ensure that I was doing things correctly. I have learned a lot and thoroughly enjoyed my time here. I think that the fact that the university is very lucky to have the equipment that they do as it allows the students to practice before they go into the clinical setting, and this is something that our university could benefit from. The 2 days on clinical placement were very informative as we were able to see new techniques such as IMRT which we don't have at home. This was very interesting but I found that the relaxed attitude of the department was very different to our department at home, and I didn't like the fact that the staff was not in full uniform – I think this looked quite unprofessional. Overall I think the experience has been great and I am very glad that I took part in the exchange. (Northern Ireland).
- My 3 months studying in Haarlem has been a brilliant experience. I really enjoyed the course content and the way in which it was taught. Geert was brilliant. The university was so modern and the equipment available for student use was excellent. Placement in the hospital I felt was very beneficial and very interesting. There was plenty of free time available for some sight seeing which was very enjoyable. The Dutch students were really nice, extremely friendly and helpful. - I am a bit disappointed of the organizing of the study and I did not learn as much as I expected to. There is too much self-study, and especially when the topic is almost totally new. When we first had a supervisor in our class I think the classes were good since we were able to ask for help and guidance, and LEARN. More placement would also be good. From the two days we had I learned a lot and I really enjoyed it! Also the laid back attitude and the few classes was very different from the system I'm used to from home. (Also an experience) Norway.

We felt at home, by knowing them. (Malta).

good as well it was a good experience I will never forget I will visit Holland may be next year. It was great thank you a lot!!!!!! (Malta).

- My experience was perfect, great, in any kinds of ways. I really liked to be in Holland, and particularly to be at the INHOLLAND University. When I had to make my decision of coming or not, I had to think twice, but now I know that I have made the right choice! First of all, the school is fantastic; it has everything we needed to study and to practice. The library is very actual and we can even search for everything we need, in the library online. The school has a lot of computers, more than enough for all the students. Secondly, the teachers use methods to make the lessons more enthusiastic and they are always able to help us. They try to have a good relation with all the students. Thirdly, the MBRT students are really nice, and we knew that if we had a problem, they would be always there for us. Bergen:

- I like it very much and I love the country. I think they must organise more activities and I think they must give the students a little more money. I think that is also a chance for students with not so much money (Haarlem)
- I had a really good time. Beautiful country. We have seen a lot of things, which we organised mostly ourselves. School and practical placement were really good. Will come back during the summer (Haarlem)
- It was a beautiful country. We did a lot by ourselves. Went weekend to Oslo, skiing in Voss, Norway in a nutshell etc. They gave us the feeling that we were welcome. It is a little bit a pity that there was not a lot of excursions and when they were it was during school or practical placement, so we didn't have time to come (Haarlem)
- Norway was a fantastic experience and I am very pleased I took part in the exchange, bur Norway is a very expensive country and I was not aware of how expensive it was (Ipswich)
- Worthwhile experience/ <Met nice people and made good friends. Norway is a beautiful country, definitely a good choice. School and placement well organised and the people very helpful (Ipswich)
- This experience taught me a lot. How to better work in a group and how to deal with projects. I have learned also what are the main differences in radiography courses between Portugal and Norway in which concerns the classes and the practical placement. Everybody was very helpful and accommodating and I felt very supported in school and in the hospital. The thing I missed more was the social activities (Coimbra)
- It was good and I learnt a lot (Coimbra)
- Overall a good experience. Further development of social activity ad the language course would improve the exchange a lot (Belfast)
- Language in the hospital as very difficult to overcome. Met and lived with very nice people. Inadequate information regarding academic work and credit from home institution. Experience has been fine! (Belfast)

- It was very nice here. I learned a lot in the lessons and especially in the hospital. It was sad that the Norwegian language lesson was not good for our direction. But I learnt a lot Norwegian in the hospital. I love the country and the Norwegian people. They were all so friendly. I did not like the clinical placements, because the radiographers talked in Maltese the whole time and most of the time ignored me. I could not do anything, but they weren't explaining either. We learned about the IV's and that was very nice. (Haarlem)
- Good! Had a nice time here. Our lecturers, teachers and contact people were nice. They did a really good job. I knew that if I had a problem they could help me. The accommodation was OK, could have been better maybe, but the most important was that the whole Erasmus group was together in the same place. I would love to stay here for 1 month longer. - The Erasmus exchange to Malta has been a valuable experience for me. I have had the chance to socialise with other people from different nationalities and experience living in a different country. The organisation of the Malta institution is very organised. The accommodation is better than student accommodation in the UK, with good facilities of Internet, café, phones, gym. This isn't the case and the students wouldn't know each other as well. Almost everything is cheaper; public transport is an awful lot better and there is so much to see and to do. The language barrier can be awkward at times and some people have literally no English, but for the most part, especially the younger generation, spoken English is quite good and you only really need to know the basics in Greek. The college is very different from our college in Ireland, which is very spacious and new. College here is similar to a school and I got a shock when I entered to find everyone smoking. The Greek food was amazing and it is something I will really miss when I get home! Because the college was on strike for

nearly 3 months we had most of our lectures in the hospitals. Because of this we were told to meet somewhere, but never really told where we were going or what we were doing. This I found hard because I'd just arrived and it all seemed so intimidating. All in all though Erasmus in Athens is a fantastic opportunity. I am very glad I choose to come here as it really is a completely different culture. I would recommend it to everyone (Dublin)

- I found my time in Athens was a great learning experience in both life and radiography. I was amazed by some of the differences between hospitals in Greece and in Ireland especially in terms of patient care. I was glad I never ended up as a patient in Greece! However it was interesting to see the approach to different exams and I feel I learnt things which will benefit me in my career. The best thing about Erasmus was meeting so many new people and experiencing life in another culture. There are things I will miss and things I can't wait to leave behind (Dublin)
- Athens was great and most of the academic and clinical placement has been good. I missed more organisation when it comes to social happenings. There is a lot of Erasmus students in Athens all year around in other schools, but we were never introduced to other Erasmus students except from the ones in radiography. There is an Erasmus organisation here for all the Erasmus students that organises parties, trips and other happenings, but we did not find out about this before we had been here for 1,5 months and we found them on our own. But overall I had a blast!! Athens is lovely and I have got to meet a lot of new people (Bergen)

Porto:

- I found the exchange to be an excellent experience. I learnt a lot about Portugal, both culturally and medically. The coordinators were very attentive and made sure we were OK throughout our stay and organised event for us. The students also invited us along to social events. The cost of living here was very good and the excellent transport system made it easy to get around. I enjoyed greatly all practice experience, gained on clinical placement, which was a lot more than I would get at home in certain topic areas. Santo Antonio was disappointing, but I learned a lot from Hospital Sao Joao and Gaia. (Belfast)
- The Erasmus experience has been very positive. Porto is very cheap and affordable so it was a good choice. I have learnt more on the topics here in Porto (Women's studies) than I would have done at home. The staff at the university and hospital were very friendly and went out of their way to help us. Accommodation was reasonably priced and had all facilities we needed. Transport to hospitals was excellent as the metro system is very good and monthly tickets at student rates are available. University within walking distance. Students at the university were very welcoming and invited us out with them. The lectures and placements were delivered in excellent English, so the language barrier was minimal. (Belfast)
- Learned a lot about a different culture and way of living. Seen differences from Norway, both good and bad. Improved my English ...maybe... This exchange has been very good and I would recommend it to other students. Everyone has been very helpful! The classes have been very good and so has the practical placement.(Bergen)
- This exchange has been a great experience of another city, culture and way of living. I have also seen now different departments work in hospitals in Portugal, which has been very interesting. During my stay I have learned to be more confident, improved my English (I hope) and met a lot of nice and friendly people. Both classes and clinical practical placement have been good, but not too much, so we have had time to discover both Porto and Portugal (Bergen)
- I found this exchange excellent on both academic and personal level. I gained experiences, I believe I would not have gained at home, in areas I have yet to study at home eg. Performing mammograms. I also got to experience Portuguese culture and was able to travel much of Portugal during the Erasmus program. My tutors were always very friendly, accessible and helpful. That helped us both with academic queries and with questions about Porto as a city, such as transport, food, shopping, soccer etc. I also was able to make friends from other countries and was able to gain an insight into other cultures as a result. Summary: brilliant experience and Big thanks!!! (Dublin)
- I have enjoyed the Erasmus exchange in Porto. I feel I have benefited greatly from all aspects as I have learned about the clinical aspect of the topics we studied, learned about the Portuguese Health Care and the culture of Portugal in General. During my time in Porto I have also learned basic Portuguese and think I will continue to learn once I return home. The tutors that we had were very friendly and helped us to take the maximum benefit from our time here. They informed us to contact them if we ever had any problems and arranged for us to go different places ie football matches. I feel I have learned a lot and got a lot of practical, hand on experience – Thank you !! (Belfast)

Lund:

- This has been a growing experience for me. It has been interesting to live with students from all over the world, and have made many new friends. There has been some problem with the CT and MRI equipment, but I have learned a lot. I am particularly interested in MRI, so I was allowed to perform exams by myself (with some assistance if needed). I feel more confident in doing neuro examinations on both CT and MRI. I was well accepted in both the hospitals and school. I also want to say that the teachers at the university have been very kind and helpful and available when there has been a problem. The clinical placement, besides some equipment problems, have been interesting and I feel more

capable and more prepared for the working life. One slightly negative thing: The university administration was in charge of the student integration, so this resulted in that we did not have much contact with other radiography students, other than a short meeting at school and meeting other Swedish students in clinical practice, but on the other side we met students in every branch of education and from all over the world. So my overall impression of my stay in Sweden has been positive and rewarding (Bergen).

- I have had a very enjoyable exchange and I have found the Swedish people to be very nice and helpful, when they have got to know you. The position of the accommodation was brilliant and it was a comfort to be living with other international students. I have learnt a great deal about radiography in Sweden and about neuro MRI and CT. The costs of travel to and from Malmö is significant and students should be warned of this cost. Erna (lecturer) and the mentors in both hospitals were brilliant, very helpful and could not have done more to help us. I feel very lucky to have undertaken an Erasmus exchange in Sweden. I hope to come back here to visit.
