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## Travel Information

Upon arrival at Bologna Marconi Airport, the nearest airport, there are two main options to reach Rimini:

- Shuttle Italy Airport

A direct coach service departing from Bologna Marconi Airport and arriving in Rimini, with stops at Rimini Railway Station or Piazzale Fada. The fare is approximately €27 (one way) and the journey takes around 1 hour and 30 minutes.

- Marconi Express + Train

A monorail linking the airport to Bologna Centrale railway station. From there, trains to Rimini are available. The combined cost is €12.80 for the Marconi Express plus around €10.80 for the train ticket. The overall travel time is about 2 hours.

## Weather

Weather in Italy from January to mid-March varies by region. In Rimini, on the Adriatic coast, conditions are generally cool and changeable, with average daytime temperatures between 5°C and 13°C. Rain and cloudy skies are frequent, while humidity and coastal winds can make it feel colder.

Northern areas are usually colder and harsher, especially near the Alps, while southern regions tend to be milder and sunnier.

It is advisable to bring warm clothing such as coats, sweaters, and long trousers, together with a waterproof jacket or umbrella. Closed shoes are recommended, while lighter layers may be useful towards March. A swimsuit may also be useful, as depending on the weather it can even be possible for the more adventurous to swim in the sea as early as March.

## Hospital “Infermi” Rimini

The Infermi Hospital in Rimini is located approximately three kilometers from both the university campus and the city center. It is well connected by public transportation, although travel times may vary depending on traffic conditions. Given that Rimini is a flat city, the use of bicycles is highly recommended as a practical and efficient means of transport.



As a city with a strong tourist vocation, Rimini hosts a hospital facility that provides 531 inpatient beds distributed across its various departments. Within the Radiology Unit, the hospital is equipped with two 1.5 Tesla MRI scanners, three 128-slice CT scanners, two linear accelerators, four mammography units with tomosynthesis technology, and several conventional radiology rooms serving both emergency cases and scheduled procedures.

## Rimini city

Rimini is a coastal city in Emilia-Romagna with a rich historical and cultural background. Among its most iconic landmarks are the Tiberius Bridge, dating back to 21 AD during the Roman Empire, and the Arch of Augustus, built in the 1st century BC. The city lies entirely on flat terrain, which makes cycling an easy and practical means of transportation, supported by extensive cycle paths and a renovated seafront promenade.



Rimini also offers a wide range of facilities for both individual and team sports, many of which are available through university agreements. For those interested in exploring the surrounding area, nearby destinations include Santarcangelo di Romagna, known for its medieval charm, and the Republic of San Marino, one of the world's oldest republics.

## Student life

Student life in Rimini is lively and diverse. The city is considered one of Italy's prime destinations for nightlife, offering numerous venues and events. At the same time, it hosts a variety of cultural, historical, and food-and-wine initiatives, providing opportunities to experience the region's traditions alongside its dynamic social scene.
